Viktoriya Prokhorenko, Head of the "ECITS Control Center" of the Department of Information Technologies of the State Judicial Administration of Ukraine, Lawyer, judicial expert, master of state administration, post-graduate studnet of the Department of Constitutional and Administrative Law of the Law Faculty of the National Aviation University (specialization "Law"). Ms. Prokhorenko has 12 years of experience in the field of public service. She has been working in the judicial system since 2012.



Sergiy Suchenko, Legal Advisor with the USAID Justice for All Activity in Ukraine, judicial administration specialist with 20 years of increasingly complex legal professional experience, providing technical assistance for governance, policy development and court IT to Ukraine's judiciary.



Tetyana Opanasyuk, Head of the Legal Department of the State Judicial Administration of Ukraine. Ms. Opanasyuk is a graduate of the National Law University named after Yaroslav the Wise" (2007), Lviv University of Business and Law (2013) and the National Academy of Public Administration under the President of Ukraine (2019), Master of Law, Master of Public Management and Administration, also a graduate of the innovative academic program on judicial administration, conducted by the SJA of Ukraine in partnership with the National School of Judges of Ukraine with the support of the USAID Fair Justice Project and the University of Michigan (2013). Since 2010, Ms. Opanasyuk has been working on positions of Chief of Staff of the Commercial Court of the Rivne region and of the Rivne Commercial Court of Appeal; Deputy Head of the Legal Department of the SJA Ukraine. Has 21 years of experience of working in justice system. Ms. Opanasyuk is also the Trainer of the National School of Judges of Ukraine.



Semen Kravtsov, PhD, Attorney-at-law. As a National Expert of the EU Project Pravo-Justice, he mostly deals with the improvement of civil, commercial and administrative procedures and assists the Atrocity Crimes Advisory Group. Semen has professional advisory experience in the development of IT systems. He also worked at the Court of Cassation for five years as a judicial assistant.



Andrii Ryshchenko, judge speaker of Dnipropetrovsk regional administrative court, coordinator Dnipro Regional justice reform council EU Project Pravo-Justice, President GEMME Ukraine, in 2020 he was the first judge in Ukraine who allowed online hearings during COVID-19 quarantine measures. As the coordinator of Dnipro Regional Justice Reform Council EU project «Pravo-Justice» (RJRC) and as a member of different working groups of Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine Andrii provide consultations on different legal matters during law enactment process. At this point as a President of GEMME Ukraine is engaged in the promotion of mediation in Ukraine and the implementation of IT solutions in court.

Daniel Shin is a graduate of Northwestern University (B.A.), Mannheim Universität (M.A.), and William & Mary Law School (J.D.). He is a licensed attorney in Virginia and a Certified Information Privacy Professional – United States (CIPP/US).

Prof. Shin is the Center for Legal and Court Technology's (CLCT) Cybersecurity Researcher at William & Mary Law School and the Coastal Node Commonwealth Cyber Initiative Research Scientist.

He focuses his research on the intersection of emerging technology and law, including as it pertains to blockchain technology, the Internet of Things, and artificial intelligence. One of his research interest centers around the implications of deep-fakes technology and its role in facilitating disinformation campaigns
